David Bau, Interactive Software Architect, Santa Fe Institute





The SCIS is a a multi-disciplinary, cross-country initiative to promote research and policy change to advance greater equality.

Professor Valodia is a part-time member of the Competition Tribunal in South Africa. He is also a Commissioner of National Minimum Wage Commission and Chair of the Academy of Science of South Africa (Assaf) Standing Committee on Science for the Reduction of Poverty and Inequality. In August 2016 Professor Valodia was appointed by President Cyril Ramaphosa to chair the Advisory Panel on the National Minimum Wage. This led to the introduction of a National Minimum Wage in South Africa. Professor Valodia is currently Chair of the Minimum Wage Commission of South Africa. In early 2018, he was appointed to a Panel to advise the Minister of Economic Development on amendments to the Competition Act. Professor Valodia has also served on a Panel of Experts to advise the Minister of Finance on Value-Added Taxes and zero-rating, and the Minister of Higher Education on the funding of higher education in South Africa. He serves as a member of President Ramaphosa's Presidential Economic Advisory Council (PEAC) in South Africa.

Professor Valodia has worked with a number of international institutions including the International Labour Organisation (ILO), the World Bank, the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) and the United Nations Development Fund for Women (UNIFEM) and UN Women. He is a member of the Board of the United Nations Research Institute for Social Development (UNRISD), and a member of the Board of the United Nations Research Institute for Social Development (UNRISD), and a member of the Board of the research network, Women in Informal Employment: Globalizing and Organizing (WIEGO). Lori Wallach is the director of the Rethink Trade program at American Economic Liberties Project. She is also Senior Advisor to the Citizens Trade Campaign, the U.S. national trade justice coalition of unions and environmental, consumer, faith, family farm and other groups. Wallach, a 30-year veteran of international and U.S. trade debates starting with the 1990s fights over NAFTA and WTO, has an encyclopedic knowledge of trade pacts, policies, outcomes, and politics. She is an internationally recognized expert on trade with experience advocating in Congress and foreign parliaments, trade negotiations, courts, government agencies, the media, and in the streets.

Dubbed "the Trade Debate's Guerrilla Warrior" in a National Journal profile and "Ralph Nader with a sense of humor" in a Wall Street Journal profile, Wallach combines a lawyer's expertise on the terms and outcomes of agreements with strategic insights, experience and relationships from the front lines of trade debates. Wallach's specialty is translating arcane trade issues into accessible language that helps to engage policymakers and to empower the people who will live the results to participate in "trade" debates. She is currently focused on the dangerous Big Tech "digital trade" ploy to hijack trade negotiation to lock in enforceable rules that can internationally preempt and shut down countries' efforts to break the largest platforms' monopoly powers and regulate the digital sphere for the public interest; supply chain disasters from shortages of essential goods to price-gouging caused by decades of hyperglobalization and corporate concentration; and the trade-pact-enforced knoweldge monopolies limiting access to affordable medicines and other lifesaving technologies .

A lawyer who has worked in television news and on political campaigns, Wallach has testified on digital trade, USMCA, TPP, numerous FTAs, WTO, China trade, NAFTA, Fast Track, and other globalization issues before 30 congressional committees. She has appeared as a trade commentator on MSNBC, Fox, CNN, ABC, Bloomberg, PBS, NPR, and numerous foreign outlets. She has been published and quoted in The New York Times, Wall Street Journal, The Washington Post, Financial Times, Foreign Policy, The Economist, Forbes, USA Today, and more. She was named to "Politico's 50" list of thinkers, doers, and visionaries transforming American politics for her leadership in the Trans-Pacific Partnership debate.

Books Wallach has written on trade include The Rise and Fall of Fast Track Trade Authority (2013) and Whose Trade Organization? A Comprehensive Guide to the WTO (2004). In 1991, she began Public Citizen's trade program, founding its Global Trade Watch division in 1995 and directing it for 26 years through 2021. Wallach was a founder of the Citizens Trade Campaign, the U.S. national coalition representing more than 11 million Americans, and serves on its board. Wallach is a native of Wisconsin, graduated from Wellesley College and Harvard Law School, and now spends much of her time in Washington, D.C.

Marcos Nobre is Professor of Political Philosophy at the University of Campinas (Unicamp), Senior Researcher and former President of the Brazilian Center of Analysis and Planning (Cebrap), Principal Investigator of the Maria Sybilla Merian Centre Conviviality-Inequality in Latin America (Mecila), and member of the Deliberative Council of the National Council for Scientific and Technological Development (CNPq). Foxglove has won multiple legal cases against governments including ending the use of racist Home Office visa streaming algorithm, ending the disastrous A Level grading algorithm and pausing the NHS data grab.

Foxglove's platform power strand of work uses policy, legal and campaign interventions in the UK, Europe and South Africa to challenge the root cause of big tech harms: their size. This work aims to push regulators to block more big tech mergers and, in time, to design structural interventions that will deconcentrate the sector and to challenge harms stemming from the concentration of tech power.

And because there is no AI or social media without workers - Foxglove supports tech workers around the world to challenge and fix their unfair and unlawful workplaces. Together with our Kenyan partners we have multiple cases against Meta, TiKTok and their outsourcing companies in the Kenyan courts challenging union busting and unlawful treatment. We have a second pathbreaking case in Kenya seeks structural change to Meta's harmful business model. If successful, it will be the first-ever case to force changes to Facebook's algorithms. We also supported the formation of the African content moderators union and support AI workers and data labellers to challenge their harmful working conditions around the world.

Prior to founding Foxglove Martha worked at the human rights organisation Reprieve.




